A Few Fundamentals About Owning a Cat

Cats, now the most popular pet in Europe and North America were once described as anti-social animals, but this is no longer regarded as true. Although very different from dogs, cats need interaction and most importantly, your loving attention!

When you bring a new cat or kitten into your home you'll have to decide whether your pet will live strictly indoors or will be allowed outside. There are advantages and disadvantages in both cases. Free-roaming cats are prone to more illnesses and have a shorter life expectancy, as they can be hit by cars, attacked by other animals and exposed to external parasites such as ticks, fleas, worms and earmites.

Conversely, if your cat never ventures outside you must provide him or her with physical and mental stimulation, including interaction with you, exercise, scratching posts and a clean toilet area. Whatever your decision may be following a few simple guidelines to direct your cat's behaviour can ensure that harmony reigns in your cat-loving household.

It has definitively been a life changing experience for me and my husband. For some reason you have this notion that all shelter dogs are troubled and broken. But here you have Ginny, the most beautiful, kindest, loyal soul I have ever met in my life. We can only learn from her and my hope is that more people take the time to get to know a dog like Ginny.

We originally adopted Ginny because we already had a lab puppy Zoá who loved any form of dog company and who was a little lonely during the day when we were at work. We did not even realise how needy Zoá really was until Ginny came along. Looking back I now see that Zoá was more like a baby and Ginny truly assisted in teaching Zoá much needed normal dog behaviour and also played a big role in building her independence. Zoá no longer requires 24/7 attention and we now sometimes ask her very nicely for some puppy love! Zoá has also made a best friend for life and this is the most rewarding of all.

Almost four months later and the two girls are inseparable; they eat, sleep, play and dig huge holes in the back yard together. They both love the beach and Ginny is quite the athlete. It might sound crazy but when she runs off the leash at full speed on the beach I sometimes feel the freedom in each leap she takes and I think back to the first day we met her at the kennels and how many dogs still await this feeling of freedom and how incredibly sad this is; as this should be a basic right for every dog. We have no regrets about the adoption and as much as we love Zoá we will never again buy a puppy - I think our eyes and our hearts have been opened by Ginny to so many possibilities when it comes to adopting from a shelter.
