## BABOON MANAGEMENT DURING THE LOCKDOWN

All homeowners are earnestly requested to please consistently apply the following Baboon Management Techniques.

- Keeping all waste/rubbish (including shopping bags) and food completely out of sight at all times.
- Secure all bins with bungee cords, dog leashes or clips to prevent baboons from opening and scattering the contents.
- Where possible, keep bins in a garage or shed where there is no visibility or access as baboons rely heavily, firstly on sight.
- Create barriers wherever possible electric fencing is effective, even the orange polywire type used for cattle and other livestock will work if it is set up correctly on the top of a wall. Thorn branches may also be used to create a barrier.
- If a baboon is in your yard making loud noises (banging pot lids together, air horns, tazers, deep voice shouting, toy cap guns etc) to chase them away.
- Spraying them with water from hosepipes or 'wazooka' toy guns. Even the action of pointing a garden hose with a spray nozzle is often effective even if the water jet doesn't actually reach them.

- Do not corner a baboon. If you are in a room with a baboon, as scary as they seem, do not look directly at them. Open a window or another door and then move away without eye contact. The baboon <u>WILL</u> choose the easiest route <u>AWAY</u> from the threat.
- Whatever you do <u>NEVER</u> offer them food and <u>NEVER</u> try to take food from them. If you hand-feed them, they see you as lower ranking (<u>BABOONS NEVER SHARE</u>) and then will in future <u>TAKE</u> from you and if you resist they can hurt you.
- DO NOT let your dogs bark at the baboons or make any aggressive moves towards them in an enclosed yard, if they tangle with a big adult male they will come off second-best. Call them away calmly and quietly and keep them inside until the baboons leave or are chased off. Remember your dog picks up on your fear/discomfort/anger and will react accordingly.
